Imperial Portrait of the Emperor Caligula, God and Ruler

The Roman literature tells us that the Emperor Caligula proclaimed himself a god and erected a golden statue of himself in a temple in the Capitolium in Rome. His personal correspondence says that this emperor also intended to place his golden image in the great temple of Jerusalem. Ancient inscriptions provide evidence that cults worshipped Caligula as a god in eastern parts of the Roman Empire.

This magnificent gilt bronze head was probably the focal point of a temple. It combines the classic good looks of portraits of this Caesar's dynasty with his own well-known features. In this way, Caligula distinguished himself as a descendent of gods and rulers as well as a god/ruler in his own right. Coins minted during his brief and turbulent reign do so as well. The bronze sestertius clearly shows this likeness.
